

- **Georgian Script:**
  - **Characters:** ლ, ჳ, ჴ
  - **Language:** Georgian.
  - **Discussion:** The Georgian alphabet is used for writing the Georgian language. "ლ" corresponds to the sound /d/. "ლ" and "ლ" are less commonly used and do not form recognizable words in this context.
